About Our School District

Louisville Ky

- 2024 population = around 618,000
- Fastest growing communities = Hispanic & multiracial groups

Jefferson County Public School System

- Largest school system in Kentucky; 30th largest school district
- 168 schools; 100 are elementary

Total student body - 96,000 students; 79% of children living in Louisville

attend JCPS

- 139 languages spoken
- 66.6% eligible for free and reduced lunches



About Our School & Library

Hawthorne Elementary School

- 400+ students; 55% minority; 47% economically disadvantaged
- 25% are EL learners & 45% of staff born in another country
- Magnet status 2023-2024; only elementary in JCPS with Spanish magnet status
- Growing EL program

Hawthorne Library Media Center

- 1-to-1 technology
- Budget \$3,000; raise additional funds through book fairs
- Fixed schedule; no assistant
- Collaboration takes place outside the school day





About Our School

Hawthorne Elementary School

- Vision Every Hawthorne student will develop into a globally and culturally competent student.
- **Mission** We will cultivate learning experiences in a dual language environment. We will do so by preparing our students to be:
 - Bi-literate
 - Bi-cultural
 - Bi-lingual



The Challenge

Our school is a dual-language immersion program. This involves not only learning how to speak and read in Spanish but embrace & engage with a wide range of Hispanic cultures.

How can we, as storytellers, share our Hispanic heritage to strengthen our Hawthorne culture?

How can we take our strengths and create a place that embraces our Hispanic culture?



The Serendipitous Adventures of 2 Educators

• When we began developing a unit of learning framed using the Guided Inquiry Design, we had no idea this adventure would lead to so many learning experiences for our students, our staff, and ourselves!

Through the Guided Inquiry Design framework, we kept our focus on student engagement, authentic learning, and reflection while mastering research skills.

• Our initial focus was to create a presentation for the October Hispanic Heritage Festival that showcased our Hispanic/Latinx families.

The Serendipitous Adventures of 2 Educators

• As in life, opportunities began to weave into our activities and before long, we found ourselves engaging with great collaborations between our students, staff and others outside of our building.

 Our goal with this presentation is to share our adventure and inspire you to find fellow innovators and create learning opportunities that change both you, your fellow teachers, and students too!

Summer 2022 Professional Development: instructional framework

<u>Guided Inquiry Design</u> (Kuhlthau, Maniotes, Caspari) with Yenixsi Morales – 4th/5th grade Spanish Literacy Educator

- Learning framework structured around collaboration between teachers and school librarians
- Focus is on inquiry learning process; students construct personal meaning as they progress through six stages
- Outcome
 - Provided time for us to work together before school year began.
 - Resulting project focused around the question who are we as a hispanic community?

Summer 2022 Professional Development: instructional framework

Project Based Learning with Ashleigh Glickley

- Students actively engaging in real-world and personally meaningful projects (Buck Institute for Education)
- Ensured instructional framework
 - ID'ed driving question
 - Sustained inquiry
 - Is authentic real-world aspect
 - Student voice & choice
 - Reflection time

Summer 2022

National Geographic & 2892 Miles to Go: Geographic Walk for Justice Project

- Ashley Lamb-Sinclair, fellow educator/parent involved with National Geographic School Initiative
 - Began integrating NatGeo's <u>Explorer Mindset Learning Framework</u> during Covid

Learning Framework

Professional training to develop storytelling skills including access to audio recording equipment

Pathway – Student Engagement

- ❖ 4th & 5th grade students 100 + students
- During Spanish literacy instruction & Library classes

Standards driving the focus:

- 4.G.MM.1 Compare the distinctive cultural characteristics of groups that immigrate.
- 4.I.Q.1 Ask compelling questions about migration and settlement.
- 4.H.CH.1 Describe how migration and settlement impact diverse groups of people as they encounter one another.
- C.4.5: Conduct short research projects that build knowledge through investigation of different aspects of a topic.


Learning in classroom - Group work


- Bilingual Interviews of 21 Hispanic community members
 - 3 questions
 - Where are you from?
 - What brought you to Louisville?
 - Why is being bi-lingual important?
 - Audio recording
 - Created 2 types of posters; new knowledge & interviews
 - Presented to community during Hispanic Heritage Festival


Activity – School-wide Game

 - Student-driven questions
 - Relevant & reliable resources
 - Google Slides
 - Vocaroo
 - Print books, Britannica Encyclopedia
 - Cited resources
 - Outcome school-wide game "Where in the world has the Hawk flown?" Available electronically and tracked the game on a hallway bulletin board





- Local initiative
- Empowers students to "be the change" as we make Louisville our Classroom and Justice our Curriculum
- Grow Readers, Grow Leaders Initiative


Project Focus – foster advocacy in our students

- Parent desire to check-out books written in Spanish
- Small group of 4th/5th grade students
- Research about home bilingual libraries
- Met before school
- Presented to group of community members for feedback and/or support
- Raise funds to purchase books for EL students K-5; 3 distributions/year





Justice Now Presentation



Community Outreach Outcome

- 2892 Miles to Go: Geographic Walk for Justice Project
- Justice Now Initiative
 - April 2023 Presented to community members during Justice Fest 2023
 - Received feedback and support
- ALA Sara Jaffarian Award
 - Funds awarded purchased over 700 dual language books for home libraries

February 2024

FRC sponsored Hispanic Literacy Night

- Hispanic students selected over 10 books for home library
- Titles available in both languages
- Next book distribution May 2024
