# PROGRAMMING Librarian

#### **Lessons Learned**

- Create a game plan and be ready to pivot.
- Streamline communication.
- Seek out partnerships and funding.
- Tap into support from campus resources and services.
- Increase accessibility and impact.
- Diversify participant feedback.
- Bigger isn't always better.
- Debrief and time to reflect.




# Discovering How Art Can Affect Our Lives

#### **Planning**

- Board made list of potential classes
- Chose beading, knitting, paper crafts, infusible ink, fabric crafts, and Cricut crafting to start
- 3 Board members would teach the classes to start
- Made up basic lesson plans and materials lists for 10 people
- Decided to use the National Gallery of Art's critical thinking steps in our program (see, think, wonder) and add "create"
- Determined questions for each class
- Made sure we could provide examples
- Beginner classes with snacks and drinks provided



#### **Planning**

- Some classes would make items for others and one would recycle scrap fabric
- A community scrapbook to be filled with pictures drawn by people in the community that highlight the things they love about our town
- After receiving the grant, materials lists were double checked and materials were ordered
- Instructors assigned to specific dates and times
- Asked instructors to provide handouts for each class



#### Goals

- 1) to establish our first ever, art program
- 2) to teach beading, paper crafts, Cricut crafts, and knitting and create a community sketchbook that use the National Gallery of Art's critical thinking steps plus adding "create"
- 3) to teach participants of all ages to really look at things (see)
- 4) To think about what they see
- 5) To wonder about what they see ask questions
- 6) To have participants <u>create</u> a project based off of #3-5
- 7) To show how patterns, colors, textures, available supplies, etc. can affect the art they create




#### Goals

- 8) Participants will be able to adapt as needed
- 9) To give participants confidence in what they learned
- 10) To have them design their project using the NGA's 3 steps
- 11) To help our community become more excited about our library
- 12) Make interesting classes so people want to come
- 13) Get people excited so they come to multiple classes
- 14) to have what is learned make a difference in many lives
- 15) to be able to continue the program into the future
- 16) to have fun!




#### Class #1 – Is Using the Color Wheel Important When Designing a Project?

The class will use critical thinking to determine if using the color wheel is important when designing a project. We will look at some examples and consider whether it truly dose. Using critical thinking and observation, we will discuss the reasons why we each believe a certain one is appealing or makes something look good. 

#### **Challenges**

- Advertising
- Predicting number of participants
- ># of laptops and Cricut machines
- Experience participants had with laptops and Cricut
- > Sketchbook challenges
- > Patrons desire to do crafts outside of class
- More kids than anticipated



#### **Lessons Learned**

- ✓ People that have taken the classes say they are even better than they imagined and that they really like them! If we get them to come to a class, they will come to more!
- ✓ Later times (10AM or later) on Saturday mornings draw more people
- ✓ Cricut classes need 2 instructors due to student and tech issues
- ✓ Adults are reluctant to draw
- ✓ Tons of new class ideas come from questions during classes
- ✓ When participants make an item for someone else, they also wanted to make one for themselves
- ✓ Patrons (esp. kids!) love the art we've done and come in regularly asking to do things that were learned or requesting to take home something we used so they can finish a project
